Writing Tasks

Task 1: Write an Information Report on something that is made of gold.

- Must be at least 5 paragraphs:
 - Paragraph 1: Introduction (brief description)
 - Paragraph 2: Function and features
 - Paragraph 3: Where did the gold come from?
 - Paragraph 4: Why was gold used to make this object?
 - Paragraph 5: Why it is valued or important to you?
- Remember to write in consistent tense, use subheadings and to use topical words.
- Read to your parent for suggestions for improvements.
- Include a photo from the Internet or an illustration of your own.
- Carefully edit your draft and publish neatly in your best handwriting in your journal or by wordprocessing.

Task 2: Choose any painting that depicts life on the goldfields.

- See the following for examples: Down on his Luck, Frederick McCubbin; Bailed Up, Tom Roberts; Ned Kelly, Sydney Nolan; S.T. Gill.
- Reproduce the scene by sketching, painting or using digital technology and include yourself in the image.
- Write a literary recount of at least three paragraphs explaining what is happening and why you
 were there.

Task 3: Write a discussion to persuade your audience that medals of achievement need to be made of real gold.

- Include a hook in the introduction, 2-3 convincing reasons for each side of the discussion with supporting evidence and examples as elaboration.
- Use connectives to order the argument, eg Moreover, Another important reason is...
- Use of conjunctions to build point and counterpoint, eg but, however
- Use of abstract words, eg achievement, excellence, pride and contentment.
- Include persuasive words with high modality and the judicious use of evidence.

Task 4: Make up a Historical Recount to write a travel diary of a three day trip aboard a Cobb & Co coach to Bathurst or Ballarat.

- Make sure you describe the scene: who was involved, when and where it happened in order.
- Read to your parent for suggestions for improvements.
- Include a photo from the Internet or an illustration of your own.
- Carefully edit your draft and publish neatly in your best handwriting in your journal or by keyboarding.

Task 5: Design a detailed diagram or map of a gold site.

- The work may include pictures, drawings, labels, titles and a map.
- You must include information with your labels and a map with a legend.

Task 6: Design and Make - Create a diorama showing a scene from the gold rush.

 The scene could include: housing (tents, lean-tos, shacks), shops (hotel, post office, general store), equipment (windlasses, buckets, pans, picks, cradles) and landforms (shafts, rubble, river).

Task 7: Musician - Write a song about the Australian Gold Rush and music to accompany it. e.g: use Garage Band.

Task 8: Design and make a PowerPoint presenting a visual experience of the Australian Gold Rush.

Task 9: Design and make a model of a scene from the Australian Gold Rush using wood, plasticine, clay, and recycled and environmental materials.

- Label main features neatly.
- The scene could include:
 - 1. housing (tents, lean-tos, shacks),
 - 2. shops (hotel, post office, general store),
 - 3. equipment (windlasses, buckets, pans, picks, cradles)
 - 4. landforms (shafts, rubble, river).

Task 10: Compose a narrative as a myth or legend where gold is a major element of plot
